Leopard's Wild Return

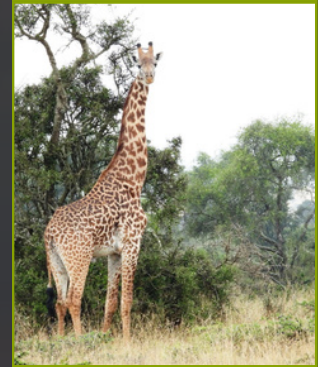

Tech meets the wild

We recently completed Earth Ranger training with KWCA, which has significantly enhanced our wildlife monitoring capabilities. This training provided us with advanced technology to conduct a landscape-wide wildlife census with unparalleled accuracy. The Earth Ranger system allows for real-time tracking and data collection, offering valuable insights into wildlife movements and behaviors.

Our census has already delivered crucial information about species distribution and health, enabling us to develop more effective conservation strategies. This integration of technology into our efforts represents a major leap forward in our mission to protect wildlife. The collaboration with KWCA has also strengthened our partnerships within the conservation community.

We're looking forward to expanding the census to cover all parts of the landscape. With the upcoming Naretunoi count on Sunday, we'll have completed approximately 70% of our planned coverage, setting a new standard in wildlife management. We are excited about continuing this innovative approach and achieving even greater successes in our conservation efforts.
